#### **Doug Boles**

#### President, Indianapolis Motor Speedway

Doug Boles has been president of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway since June 2013. Prior to this, Boles served as chief operating officer from January-June 2013 along with his role as vice president of communications for Hulman & Company, which he assumed in November 2011. Boles joined the company in November 2010 as IMS director of public relations after more than 15 years of executive-level motorsports experience in team operations, marketing, sponsorship and public relations.

In his role as president, Boles has overseen the investment of over \$100 million in the highly publicized Project 100 renovation of the Speedway, the largest sporting venue in the world, and the implementation of the 100th running of the Indianapolis 500. He and his team also secured and executed the first-ever standalone music event at IMS when it played host to the Rolling Stones on July 4, 2015. Besides these accomplishments, he is responsible for the daily operations of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway and each world-class racing event at the facility, as well as for exploring and expanding business opportunities for the Speedway. However, his most important job is overseeing safety, and if anything jeopardizes the safety of drivers or attendees, he takes that personally. He knows that the well-being of every person at IMS is of the utmost importance to a successful racing season. As the opening keynote speaker, Doug Boles will update us on driver and attendee safety, and how "it's the fans and the drivers that make IMS special."
